AT THE IMPERIAL

Daughters of the Empire Score a Great Triumph.

Under the auspices of the Loyalist, Delimita and Brunswick Chapters of the Daughters of the Empire a grand patriotic national musical festival, was held on Thursday evening in the Imperial Theatre. LOYALIST CHAPTER, DAUGHTERS OF EMPIRE

Reports of Officers on Year's Work.

I have pleasure in submitting the fifth annual report of the Loyalist Chapter I. O. D. E.

The year 1915 was indeed a busy one, and all my members showed great interest in every undertaking of the Chapter.

There have been four resignations during the year and in April the Chapter was enlarged to 53, as we felt the need of more working members, several of our members being absent in England.

Until June two meetings were held each month and all were well attended—contrary to custom, and owing to the great amount of work necessary for the boys in the trenches it was thought best to hold one meeting each month during the summer and do sewing for the Red Cross.

The following is a summary of the work carried on during the year:

On Valentine's Day the Chapter took over and ran Shand's flower store, receiving \$15.13 as their share of the profits.

The Chapter sent 68 garments to Dr. MacLaren's Hospital.

The 26th Battalion were supplied with housewives.

Mr. W. S. Fisher donated a stove which the Chapter rented; \$179.30 was realized.

In March the Chapter sent a donation of 24 pairs of socks to the Red Cross.

In April 72 sheets, 91 cup towels, 4 pairs of socks, and 2 wash cloths were sent through the Red Cross to Miss McDonald.

In April the Chapter endowed two beds in Dr. MacLaren's Hospital; \$199.00.

On Easter Tuesday the Chapter held a tea at the Golf Club and netted \$64.00.

Easter week the Chapter took over and ran McLean and Charlton's flower store, receiving 10 per cent. of all cash sales, \$12.00.

The Chapter provided the supper for the entertainment and dance which St. George's Society held on April 23rd, and were able to give \$199.00 to the Patriotic Fund and \$92.00 to the Belgian Orphan Relief Fund.

In May the Chapter held a minstrel show which netted \$95.54 for the Chapter's fund.

The annual meeting of the I. O. D. E. was held at Halifax in May and the Chapter was represented by Mrs. Bilsand.

On May 15th an Old Lined Day was held and we were able to send nine full cases to the Red Cross.

In May \$100.00 was voted to the Evangeline Home; with this some outstanding bills were paid and materials purchased which the Chapter made into garments for the home.

One hundred dollars was donated to the Red Cross in May and during the summer months the Chapter took out and completed garments for the society.

Another year has gone by without the organization of a Municipal Chapter, but in June all the N. B. Chapters I. O. D. E. met in Moncton and the Provincial Chapter was reorganized.

In July \$25 was sent to the relief of the Serbians, \$25 to the Canadian prisoners in Germany, and \$25 to a village in France, an appeal for which had been sent out from the National Chapter; \$50 to Miss Warner, nursing in France, and \$19 to our local Boy Scouts.

On August 4th to commemorate the declaration of war, a mass meeting was held in King Square, at which the Daughters of the Empire took a collection for the Patriotic Fund. The Loyalist Chapter was able to hand in \$127.53 as their collection.

During the summer the Chapter raised a talent fund for the Tuberculosis Society and in September sent them \$118.36.

Papers and magazines for wounded soldiers were collected and sent to England.

In August \$25 was sent to the Soldiers' Comforts Association.

In September the Chapter voted \$25 toward the expense fund for the Patriotic Auction which was to be held in October.

In October \$25 was given to the British Red Cross. The Loyalist Chapter united with the other Chapters Daughters of the Empire, the Rotary Club, Elks Club and Knights of Columbus in holding an auction, the proceeds of which amounted to over \$20,000.00, which was handed in to the Patriotic Fund.

Through the kindness of Judge Forbes the Chapter secured a most suitable room in the Bible Society building and since October most successful sewing meetings have been held there each Monday and Friday which have enabled the Chapter to accomplish a great deal of work for both the Red Cross, Soldiers' Comforts.

On Nov. 1st the Chapter held a Lone Soldiers' day and as a result were able to send over 300 complete packages to the Lone Soldiers at the front.

In November \$5 was sent the Victoria League, an English order, which has always been of great assistance to all Canadians in England; \$5 to Miss Edith Hegan, Bur-

Malcolm McAvity to buy what seemed most needed by the men with Mr. Kahring at the Dardanelles.

During November the Chapter sent coffee to the Armoury for the reception of the 52nd Battalion, a ton of coal to the Khaki Club, and members of the Chapter attended to the dusting of the reading and writing rooms for three days. Sandwiches were sent to the Armoury for the reception of the 69th Battalion.

Members of the Chapter helped collect subscriptions for the Patriotic Fund.

A lecture by Monsieur Andre was held in the Opera House but was not a very marked success.

In December the Chapter gave \$25 toward a fund for a convalescent hospital for wounded Canadian soldiers in Folkestone, England, and collected for same.

Five pounds was sent to Miss Powers, a nurse in France.

In January the Chapter held a Pantry Sale making \$28.58 for the Free Kindergarten.

The Chapter also put linoleum in the hall and vestibule of the Parks Convalescent Hospital, \$26.15.

Fifteen dollars was given to the Returned Soldiers Reception Committee to aid them in their work.

At present the members of the Chapter are busy working and planning for an entertainment to be held on March 2nd.

This has been our second year of war and stress and no one has been idle, I feel sure that 1916 will prove an even more successful year for the Loyalist Chapter and much more will be done to relieve the suffering at home and in Europe.

Tableaux a Feature.

Particular mention is merited of the
several tableaux presented during the
evening. The series representing well
known works of art, concluding with

The Minuet, performed by twelve ladies, was a very dainty number. The costumes were similar to those worn during the reign of the Georges and the stately measure was never seen to better advantage.

The concluding number of the evening was the tableau, John Bull. The character of this well known gentleman was taken by John Fyfeham and it was the general verdict that no one could have equalled his impersonation. Surrounded by a guard with arms presented and bayonets fixed, John Bull stood in a characteristic attitude while the vast audience sang Rule Britannia and the national anthem.

Much of the success of the evening is due the Imperial orchestra under Director Swornbourne. The selections from the Mikado during the scene, A Peep Into the Orient, were in particular appropriate.

It is seldom St. John has such a delightful treat as was afforded the tremendous audience that attended the Imperial on Thursday evening when the "Variety Revue," under the auspices of the Loyalist Chapter, I. O. D. E., was given. It would be impossible to fully describe the delightful program, as each member was a gem within itself. The quaint costumes of "ye olden time" worn by the young ladies called forth much admiration in the graceful minuet. Never before in our city have such wonderful tableaux been given. The ladies' quartette, "Dream Song" by Miss Wilhelmina Stammers, Miss Beryl Stancho, Miss Nita Brown and Miss Irene MacLean was greatly enjoyed, each young lady was presented with a beautiful bouquet. Miss Louise Knight never was heard to better advantage, her solo, The Pipes of Pan, was beautifully rendered. Miss Knight was presented with a bouquet of violets. The dancing of Miss Kaye and Mr. James Kaye was worthy of professionals and called forth rounds of applause. Mr. Guy with his faithful friend Mr. Choko MacLaren in the song, "While the British Bull-dog is Watching at the Door," was a great success. Mr. Guy is always a favorite and the fine patriotic song was well received. The Loyalist Chapter, I. O. D. E., under whose auspices the Variety Revue was given are certainly to be congratulated upon

the well performed and wonderfully thought out enjoyable entertainments given on Thursday evening.
